#### JIM KEMP - Architect of Ross Design Review Board

RPOA would like to salute Jim Kemp for his years of service to Ross as he and his wife Linda head off on their next adventure. Jim and a few others formed the impetus for Ross' Design Review Board which has much improved communication in town and shortened the length of the Council meetings!

Jim got his master's degree in architecture at UC Berkeley and has worked in the Bay Area for the last 40+ years. Jim shared his practice with his twin brother, Jack, in Berkeley in the '70s and '80s; there were some volatile meetings between reactionaries and revolutionaries in the Berkeley City Council! Jim's years of addressing town councils and design review boards

gave him a unique perspective on the value of having a design review board in Ross. He found it so interesting to understand the different personalities, the questions they ask and their separate agendas. That interest, along with his professional design training, has made design review work second nature to him.

In 1984, Jim and Linda moved to Ross to their present home. Jim and others felt Ross could greatly benefit from a design review board. The Council resisted this for many years, but in 2008 formed one with four design professionals, one person from the community and two alternates. From the professional applicants, four were chosen: Joey Buckingham, Mark Fritz, Jim Kemp and Dan Winey. This core group remains, finding the work rich and meaningful. Jim calls the group "simpatico" and one is struck by the strength of their relationships and the quiet, kind way they go about discussing the projects which come before them. None of the board's recommendations are requirements; many times applicants return repeatedly, but the results are always an improvement. Ross is very fortunate to have so much talent in one room; they bring a great deal of architectural knowledge which directly translates into a high level of design in keeping with the Ross guidelines. It's important of course that our town be beautiful, but the congenial atmosphere, neighbors sometimes meeting for the first time, make for a warm feeling of a small town functioning at a high level.

Jim and Linda have lived in Ross for 30 years; their three children, Scott, John and Kristina all went to Ross School. Since his retirement two years ago, Jim has taken up pastel landscapes which he has on display in San Anselmo at the Desta Gallery. With their move to Washington, he will have his own art studio near a lake where he can revive his love of fly fishing.

Thanks, Jim, for all you've given to Ross. May your next adventure be as idyllic as it sounds!

#### MARIN SUSTAINABILITY

The Marin County Community Development Agency's Sustainability Team develops and promotes residential energy efficiency programs designed to help Marin residents save money, reduce carbon emissions, and improve home comfort. #### **California Youth Energy Services (CYES)**

The CYES program is an easy and no-cost way to get started on energy efficiency in the home. During the summer months, college and high school-aged youth from Marin conduct "green house calls," which include energy and water evaluations and installation of LED light bulbs, power strips, and faucet aerators. Call (510) 665-1501 ext. 5 to schedule your green house call this summer.

#### **Energy Upgrade California (r) Home Upgrade**

Home Upgrade is a rebate program for homeowners looking to improve the efficiency and comfort in the home by installing new windows, upgrading the furnace, sealing/replacing ducts, improving insulation, and more. The total rebate for your project is based on how efficient you

make your home. The more yearly energy saved, the higher the rebate. Right now, the Advanced Home Upgrade option can reach up to \$6,500.
